“Time-Slice Rationality”

I defend a time-slice-centric picture of rationality, on which the relationship between two time-slices of the same person is not in principle different, as far as requirements of rationality are concerned from the relationship between two different people. There are no inTRApersonal norms that do not derive from norms that apply equally in the inTERpersonal case. I motivate this view by an internalist intuition and appeal to classic puzzle cases for personal identity. Then I show that two principles of the kind of epistemology I reject (Conditionalization and Reflection) can be replaced by new time-slice-centric principles which have all of the benefits of the old principles but none of their flaws.
